
### About The BC Oil and Gas Commission

The BC Oil and Gas Commission (Commission) is the provincial regulatory agency with responsibilities for regulating oil and gas activities in British Columbia, including exploration, development, pipeline transportation and reclamation.

The Commission's core services include reviewing and assessing applications for industry activity, consulting with First Nations, cooperating with partner agencies, and ensuring industry complies with provincial legislation and all regulatory requirements.

The public interest is protected by ensuring public safety, respecting those affected by oil and gas activities, conserving the environment, and ensuring equitable participation in production.

## Top Three Actions Taken Towards Carbon Neutrality in 2021

- 1. Buildings: The Commission aligned its building strategy to follow LEED Gold Standards for new buildings and retrofitting existing buildings. Office space reduction planning is underway to identify areas that can reduce the Commission's carbon footprint by creating space efficiencies.
- 2. Vehicles, Off-Road & Portable Equipment: The Commission reduced its fleet by eight vehicles, including three three quarter-ton trucks, two half-ton trucks and three vehicles. The Commission installed a GeoTab device in the electrical vehicle (EV) in Fort St. John, which tracks all statistics from EV vehicles to determine battery range in northern British Columbia. As vehicles are replaced, the Commission will complete research for replacement vehicles based on cost vs. benefit, efficiency, carbon footprint, geographical location and staff safety.
- 3. Paper Consumption: The Commission's transition to a paperless organization is managed by bringing awareness to employees' printing habits through displaying the cost of each print job and implementing defaults on all devices to double sided and in black and white. Print jobs are only released once authorization has been given at the device. Thereby, empowering the employee to reconsider the necessity of printing and provide the opportunity to cancel duplicates and/or cancel print jobs no longer needed.

## **Future Plans for Emissions Reduction**

Climate risk response, both in terms of adaptation and transition to a low carbon economy, are critically connected to the Commission's mandate and new strategic direction. The Commission will work collaboratively across government and industry to share policy and technical expertise, provide operational leadership and evolve its regulatory model to support B.C.'s energy transition, low carbon economy and meet future global energy needs.

Retirement of Offsets: In accordance with the requirements of the Climate Change Accountability Act and Carbon Neutral Government Regulation, BC Oil and Gas Commission (the Organization) is responsible for arranging for the retirement of the offset's obligation reported above for the 2021 calendar year, together with any adjustments reported for past calendar years (if applicable). The Organization hereby agrees that, in exchange for the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (the Ministry) ensuring that these offsets are retired on the Organization's behalf, the Organization will pay, within 30 days, the associated invoice to be issued by the Ministry in an amount equal to \$25 per tonne of offsets retired on its behalf, plus GST.
